

Safety Officer's Report

A clean boat will weather the winter better than one left dirty, washing and waxing your boat for winter storage will Protect Your Investment. It will slow rusting on exposed metals, prevent clogged cockpit drains, and repel water and snow better. Shrink wrapping is an excellent way to maintain your investment for years to come.

If you own a sail boat the Mast should be removed every 5 years or so to inspect mast and rigging fittings that cannot be inspected with the Mast up. You have to check the Keel stepped and deck stepped Mast they can fill with rain water internally, which freezes over the winter and splits the mast. Chain plates or deck fittings that are or might be leaking should be repaired before the winter rain, snow, and arrive. These areas can cause further damage and freeze cracking decks.

Merit Marks Report By P/C Tony Brown, P

We got your Merit Marks right here.

You put in the time. Now it is time for your reward. Power Squadron members who give their time and effort are eligible to receive a highly coveted Merit Mark achievement. United States Power Squadrons permanently recognize Merit Marks, often by citing them in the formal title of each member. Example: Past Commander Edward Dillon, AP, 48 Merit Marks. Your status in the Power Squadrons rises with Merit Marks. Senior Members are those with five or more Merit Marks. Life Members are those with 25 or more Merit Marks.

Twenty-nine members contributed 1,382 volunteer hours to the boating civic community last year. Any amount of time, including commuting time, you contributed to the mission of boating safety, education and fun counts towards Merit Mark credit. Attending meetings does not count, but providing a *reason* to meet is vital. Here is an example: "Served as the Flag Lt. He led the planning and did most of the arranging for the Flag Raising Ceremony. This included a raft-up. Additionally, he planned the squadron's Day on the Bay Cruise that included a D5 Party. 30 Hours."

Squadron Commanders are required to submit Merit
