


Penobscot Bay Cruise (continued)



HARBOR SAFETY: Part 1. By Lt/C Ed Jones, AP/INC Anchorages are No Wake Zones, weather it is posted on a white buoy or not. It is a common courtesy of most boaters.

What is No Wake? No Wake is the waves created behind your boat. It means to go as slow as possible but able to maintain steering and control of your boat. You are responsible for your wake and the damage or injury your wake may cause. Many boaters have "no clue" and have total disregard of the law and other boaters.

In an anchorage there are fellow boaters living aboard, cooking and grilling. Too many dinners have fallen off the grill and into the sea because another boat did not slow down in the mooring field. A grandfather was preparing tea & cookies for his grandaughter and himself. The wake of another boater caused the tea kettle to fly off the burner and spray hot water onto the little girl's chest and arms. She needed medical attention. What was a precious moment, turned tragic because of a boaters total disregard of others. This could have been prevented. Boaters need to be educated as to what can happen. They need to observe NO WAKE!

Using a "dinghy" is vital to boaters. It is their "water taxi" for getting around the harbor and to shore, visiting, picking up supplies, taking the dog to shore, and to chase down a lobsterman.

Dinghies are all sizes. Some have motors and some just a paddle. If any motor is attached to the dinghy, it is required to be registered. The registration numbers are required to be displayed on the forward half of each side of the dinghy, in 4 inch block numbers & letters in a contrasting color. I have not seen many registered in our harbor.

Each person in any boat must have a life jacket adjusted for them and readily available. (You really should wear your life jacket!) If a child is 13 years old or younger, they must wear their life jacket. Infants need an infant life jacket, even in the arms of an adult. Too many times I have seen children leaning over the bow without a life jacket. One wave can change your wholeday---maybe even take a life! Too often I see No Life Jackets for anyone!

As we motor about the harbors, keep others in mind for their safety. Talk to the violators, and explain the courtesy. BE SAFE IN THE HARBORS!
