The Emergency Engine Cutoff Switch From Executive Officer Gary Laser

This will be the last safety note for a while because my wife and I will spend the next ten weeks on the waters of the Great Lakes. This note will be the most important safety tip if you are on the water anywhere.

We all know what an "Emergency Engine Cutoff Switch" is and we should know how to use it. Engine cutoff switches have been installed in some boats for over 30 years. Why is this so important? Because this little clip can save your life and the lives of all your passengers.

Remember the movie "Splash" where Tom Hanks, stands up in the little boat and starts the engine and then falls into the water. The boat makes a lazy turn and runs over him and sends him down to the waiting arms of a Mermaid.

The lesson of course is wear an Emergency Engine Cutoff Switch and if you leave the boat, not because you wanted to, the boat stops right then and there. Simple.

The U.S. Coast Guard strongly recommends that the operator wear the switch lanyard when operating the boat, if one is installed, or install a retrofit which is easy and inexpensive.

As my wife and I enjoy the big lake in our ten foot tender. I always wear my cutoff lanyard connected to my swimsuit. I love the big lake and want to enjoy it safely and stay in the boat!!
