# Why The Urgent Need To Keep Our Educational Program Alive

When the pandemic caught the world by surprise, many Americans decided to take refuge on the water, leading to a surge in boat sales. In fact, 2020 and 2021 yielded 800,000 first-time boat buyers. That was good news for the industry as a whole, from boating manufacturers to retailers to marinas, as the recreational boating industry supports more than 690,000 jobs, according to the National Marine Manufacturer's Association. It also led to an increase in demand for **Safe Boating Courses** in person and on line. But a boating market report by Boats Group, issued in Feb\ruary, reported that the boating market began to normalize last year, with softening consumer demand. The NMMA also reported that recreational boating will maintain its popularity in 2024, but according to several boat dealers, the momentum has dissipated somewhat. However, the market still has opportunities for growth.

The market for larger yachts remains strong with affluent buyers, according to Kyle Stenzel at Spring Brook Marina. His company operates seven sales offices in Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin. Smaller boats neluding pontoons, fishing and even kayaks are up slightly with the summer season. Most interest seems to be for family friendly boats with multiple purposes. The center console fishing boat with outboard motors still remaining strong. The middle tier buyers, while they are still making purchases, are exhibiting hesitancy. Kyle stated that higher interest rates and inflation across all goods and services have made things especially difficult and the industry is seeing fewer first-time boat buyers. Still, there are many new boaters with little or no **Safe Boating Education**. There are many seasoned boaters wanting more knowledge with off-shore boating skills. Our mission is very much needed.

Discover Boating, in collaboration with Progressive Insurance, launched a television public service announcement (PSA) campaign to increase awareness of boating safety and provide resources for people looking to get started in boating. To date, the PSAs have aired more than 3,000 times across local, regional and national TV networks including ABC, NBC, CBS, and FOX affiliates in media markets such as New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, and Philadelphia, driving nearly 13 million impressions. The videos are also airing on You Tube and streaming platforms such as Apple TV and ROKU. Please take a look at these well done videos.

The need for our courses are an important part of keeping everyone on the water safe. Remember to get your Vessel Safety Check. Have a safe summer boating season on the water and on the roads.

## **Directions to the Goss Ranch**

The ranch address is 14018 SW 104<sup>th</sup> Street.

From SW 89<sup>th</sup> and Council, travel west six miles to Clear Springs Road. (You can also get to this point by traveling south on Garth Brooks in Yukon, which turns into Cemetery Road, which turns into Clear Springs Road.)

Go south on Clear Springs Road one mile to SW 104<sup>th</sup> Street.

Go west on SW 104<sup>th</sup> Street. In about 1.75 miles, you'll go down a hill and cross a creek bridge. As you go up that hill, you'll be looking at the driveways on the left side. The third one on the left has a high pipe over the cattle guard. Turn in there.

Go through the second cattle guard and the pond is on the right.

Stay clear of the electric fence.

## **OKC RIVERSPORT**

#### Summer 2024

**<u>Riversport Activities</u>** summarized from Dave, Ron, Danny and Mike's accounts of activities.)

## Stars & Stripes Event

After P/C Mike Ellis JN established contact with Noah of Riversport, he set up a work time for us on June 20, 2024. Mike and P/D/C Danny Goss SN made some basic repairs to the boats in a few hours. Saturday, June 22, 2024, XO Ron Huff, Cdr David McGhee and P/C Mike Ellis met at the Boathouse before 7am and boarded different Safety Launches. 0700-1300

**River Row Fest** July 13/21 7- 1300 (except 7-16-24) Noah notified Mike on July 12 that Riversport could use boat drivers as listed below: Row Fest Dates – Launch Drivers: July 13th – 16th: 6:45a – 11a July 18th – 21st: 6:45a – 11a

Cdr Dave worked July 13 from 0700-1300. Mike worked July 15 & 16, 18 &19. Danny worked July 16, 18 & 19.

On **MONDAY**, July 15, Mike started out at the Oklahoma River on the dock and waited for his assignment. He was assigned a smaller launch and a referee, Dennis, from New York.

Monday was slated to be a race-against-the-clock time-trial day in order to help combine racers for better quality races later. All in all that day was fun and quite enjoyable.

On **TUESDAY**, the regatta races were on the cusp of starting as Mike got down to the water's edge and was given a launch that was less than adequate. The vessel had taken on water and had to be pumped out. But he was soon once again out on the water at the finish line, guiding the launches to the buoy at the end of the track before returning to the dock.

After lunch, about halfway through the races, a scull flipped over after having crossed three lanes of race traffic and dumping two rowers into the river. Mike had an EMS as his captain this time. Later on, a launch crossed the lanes and picked up the cable that keeps the lane markers in place. The cable wrapped around the prop; no real way to clear it. So Mike directed the driver to put the engine in neutral and after that they were able to "reverse wind" with their paddle in order to unwind the cable from around the propeller.

This day was an experience in safety and understanding commands both to the rowers and to the launches.

Danny joined in on Tuesday, July 16, and learned about not wearing red! Wanting to look decent and to represent America's Boating Club, Danny chose his red OKCSPS polo shirt and red inflatable life jacket to wear. After he walked down to the east launch docks to receive his boat and captain assignment, someone noticed his redness.

Danny quipped that "a Catholic in Iran would have been more welcome" than he was at that point. It seems that red is the magic stop color for the rowing crews, which is why the officials do not want any visible red showing. So he was assigned to be Patty's driver. Patty was the finish area official, and a terrific person to drive around.

The hardest part of Danny's tasking was clearing the boats coming out of the boathouse dock and having them stay north of the racing lanes. Those sculls with their 12' oars meant he had to leave them about a 30' lane and clearance as a minimum.

Patty explained the boats can reach 12 MPH, so they can cover the 6,000 meters faster than one would think.

Definitely a fun day on the water. DON'T WEAR RED, though! Who knew ??

## **Riversport**—continued

**THURSDAY** was very interesting as Shirley, being Mike's Referee, was very talkative and enthusiastic about the sport of rowing. He learned that the classes start as AA's and go all the way to "I" (if his memory serves correctly). AA are young adults high school age, A's are 19 to 23 or so while the rest of the groups continue in age brackets all the way to 80+ years of age. Rowing looks to be a sport that just about anyone can do.

The boats are built for "featherweight" to "heavy" class and from single to eights+ where the + stands for a coxswain who drives the sculls. The idea is that the science of drafting is used in your favor and the weights of the rowers combined with the design of the boat serve together to perform 1000 meter and 2000 meter races.

Oklahoma Riversport master's track is a short track of 920 meters between the two bridges: I-35 and Central Avenue. There are seven lanes with two outside lanes.

Thursday's races were for the mixed masters meaning the ones who have experience in their years. Mixed refers to a 50/50 male-female split in the boat. Lots of fun for all those out at the water's edge

No red day. Having learned from Tuesday, Danny wore a green squadron shirt. His assignment that day was to drive the medic around the finish area.

On **FRIDAY**, Danny was again assigned to the lifeguard patrol between the finish line and the orange buoy. Sam was the life guard, so it was a fun tasking.

Staying in position to monitor the crews as they finished was the tasking. Crews were more important as these were Master's races with means older. "Older" means up to 80 years of age, so the lifeguard wanted to have a good observation position at all times.

Also, Danny learned what "hot seat" meant. A "hot seat" means either a crew person (many crews were mixed and there were many female crews as well) or the boat is quickly needed for an upcoming race. In either instance, that boat did not need to round the buoy, but could turn short to return directly to the launch and recovery or proceed back east to the Devon dock. Of course, Sam and Danny didn't learn that until late Thursday.....

The best thing about this group is that they were happy to explain the details of the sport if one just asked! After the races ended around 1230, everyone checked out.

Most everyone was happy to have the volunteers there because they kept us watered and fed.

Friday's runs were like Thursday's except for the introduction of youth to the lanes. Of the hundreds of races that took place this week there were only two sculls that flipped over with the rowers needing help to right the vessels.

The weather was more than cooperative for these races and Mike for one was very grateful for the overcast skies and cooler temps.

Gina and Noah both have thanked us for being there to help and the Referees have expressed their gratitude for having us there as experienced drivers. Mike is hoping to create an environment of cooperation between Riversport and OKCSPS and build upon a relationship of understanding that water safety and boater education is paramount.

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One huge benefit is the people we've been able to meet at OKC Riversport. Viva la boating !!
